- How high of a priority will privacy legislation be for a Biden administration?
- Is it more or less likely that we will see the passage of a federal privacy law?
- How will the contents of a federal privacy law be impacted?
- What particular issues, such as preemption and private right of action, are most likely to be affected?
- What are the new opportunities or challenges to enact a modern, forwardlooking privacy law fit for the digital economy and society?
- What do we expect to see at the state level in 2021? Will state activity be impacted by the election results? Could state activity next year impact the federal discussion?
- Are we more likely to see a Privacy Shield replacement? Could the timeline for a new agreement be impacted?
- What do we expect to see from an FTC with a Democratic majority?
